After that night, he decided to avoid public areas until he learned how to control the psychological effects that came with his time spent in Iraq. Not only that but much of that time spent at war was really a waste of time.

As important as war is, it is also a huge waste of time. My uncle was recently telling me about the history of the war he was apart of.
